What will future generations treasure about this Concrete and Metal Garage?

Houses in Goddard's Lane, mostly pre-mid-1800s, some much older, (a few modern), brick, tiled roofs.

Houses at Orchard Lea, c1987, brick, tiled roofs, obscured by trees.

Court Farm House, c1800, Grade II listed, brick, slate roof. Original front & side elevations. Only farmhouse on Village Green. Working farm to 1983. House, barn and track retain the semblance and atmosphere of the farm.


King's Barn, converted/reconstructed from Court Farm Barn (C16/C17), timber cladding over brick & timber, tiled roof, matching garage, consistent with previous farm buildings.

Houses at Court Farm, c1984, brick, render, tiled roofs, almost hidden.


The Plantation, 1947, rural social housing, brick, tiled roofs, exemplary design.

Winton Cottage, C16/C17, Grade II listed, timber frame, brick panels, tile cladding, tiled roof. Witnessed many centuries of farming.

Other dwellings, mixture from pre-1850 (to C20 mostly not in view), brick, tiled or slate roofs.





Only <u>Bowling's</u> was an independent farm.



Still subject to the Commons Acts as well as Town & Country Planning Acts.




Plan of house c1810 - c1831





Original Fireplace 1800 Stove removed c1975

Originally all fire surrounds were similar to this – two vertical & one horizontal planks and a shelf.

1883 - Dining & Sitting Room - replaced with slate/stone surrounds; Bedrooms - mouldings applied – reeding, roundels etc.

Doors

mostly 1883 or earlier



1883 Wellington knocker & Letterbox added 1883 Doorcase extended 1893 Top panel glazed

Original Front Door

1883 Some internal doors replaced, possibly all.







1883 Architraves and Mouldings added throughout house

The Wellington Knocker

1883 or earlier

The Hand of Wellington grasping the Wreath of Victory, and the Baton of a Field Marshal.

The Lion's face - British Valour overpowering Tyranny and Usurpation, by striking on the breast of its bitterest enemy, the French Eagle.

Invented in 1814 by David Bray, ironmonger, Leicester Square, London, to celebrate Wellington's victory at Elba.



The Dusons

History is everywhere

"We had all types of apple trees in the Orchard, including Dusons*"



Hambledon Deux Ans

An 18th Century cooking apple from Hampshire, popular in the Victorian era. It can store for up to two years, but was almost eradicated after the arrival of refrigeration.

Origin: Hampshire UK, 1750

Pollination: Hambledon Deux Ans is a self-sterile triploid, so requires a pollinator.

Probably planted in the Orchard c1885.



The vine was planted c1885. In the 1930s, the grapes were grown for Sherfield Court.

The Corrugated Fence







There was a corrugated fence between the garden and the farmyard. Probably built by the Palmers c1895 to stop dust from the farm blowing into the garden and house, and maybe to deter rats.

The present fence and Laurel bushes which replaced it, date from the mid 1930s.

The hedge bordering the Green is much older.








